From the Pastor's Desk

Keys to Righteousness (James 4:1-12)

Keys are a wonderful invention. In the modern world, we could hardly do without them. Keys to our houses, keys to our cars, keys to a map—even keys to a test. When I was in high school one of the students stole the key to a test for American history class and gave copies to all his friends and they all cheated. Problem was that he stole the key for the test that was being given to a different class—and they all flunked.

Door locks and ignitions and tests all use keys. The key unlocks the door, makes it run, the key gives the answers. A key can also be the key to something else—the idea or the process or the rules.

In James 4 we find keys—but not to cars and doors. Keys to righteousness. Another assignment—go read James 4:1-12 and then come back.

The first key to righteousness is found in verse four. In the second part of that verse we see that we are to keep our relationship to the world a bit loose. James tells us that even though we live in the world, we are to keep the world at arms length. Not the people but the attitudes and actions and philosophies.

The second key is humility. Verse 5 mentions envy born of personal pride. Pridefulness is the opposite of humility and acceptance of God's gifts with grace. Verse 6 says that God grants more grace to the humble. Realistically, most of the problems we have and troubles we get into involve pride.

The third key is being subject to God. Being a good subject means to serve him. Do his work. Keep his rules. God wants to make our lives better—and he has already seen the possibilities, past, present, and future—AND—he loves us perfectly. With him as our King and his Word as our guide, we will live better, longer, and more righteously.

The fourth key is from verse 7. Resist evil. Satan knows our weaknesses. God does also and scripture says he will strengthen us if we resist evil. A human being who is close to God, knows his word, and is filled with his Spirit has the power to resist evil. Plain, Simple. Not EASY, huh?

The fifth key is the opposite of the fourth. Draw near to God. We are told that if we draw near to God he will draw near to us. God is always seeking to grow us and hold us and protect us. Seeking if we have fallen and seeking if we simply haven't measured up to his goal for us. Draw near to God and he will draw near to us.

The sixth and the seventh keys are in verse 8. Do clean things and think clean things. In scripture, the mention of a hand means action or acts. When we talk about the hand of God—we are not talking about his literal hand but his works or his actions. Key six is to DO good things. Key seven it to think good thoughts—to be righteous of heart and mind. Good INSIDE. Internal righteousness will fill us from the inside out. As our hearts are—as our souls are, that is what we will become.

The eight key is to resist judging others. Again we see pride rear its ugly head. This key is to worry about our own actions and let others (and God) worry about themselves. My grandma would have loved this key—she was big on us minding our own business. You and I have enough to worry about with our own lives and our own actions. We can better spend our energy trying to keep ourselves straight if we don't squander energy on judging and gossiping about our fellow Christians., We have enough to do.

Reminder: As you travel throughout the year, please remember to collect small hotel-sized toiletry items (especially shampoos, body wash and lotions) to support Zion's ministry with the Oak Ridge unit at the Beaumont Juvenile Correctional Center. These items are used as prizes when Zion visits and plays bingo with the teenage boys there a couple of times a year.
