From the Pastor's Desk

Minister Rev. Tommy Willcockson

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lifted up; and his train filled the temple. Above him stood the seraphim. Each one had six wings. With two he covered his face. With two he covered his feet. With two he flew. One called to another, and said, "Holy, holy, holy, is Yahweh of Armies! The whole earth is full of his glory!" The foundations of the thresholds shook at the voice of him who called, and the house was filled with smoke. Then I said, "Woe is me! For am undone, because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell among a people of unclean lips: For my eyes have seen the King, Yahweh of Armies!" Then one of the seraphim flew to me, having a live coal in his hand, which he had taken with the tongs from off the altar. He touched my mouth with it, and said, "Behold, this has touched your lips; and your iniquity is taken away, and your sin forgiven." I heard the Lord's voice, saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Then I said, "Here I am. Send Me!" [Isaiah 6:1-8 World English Bible]

Jesus came to them and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to me in heaven and on earth. Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I commanded you. Behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Amen. [Matthew 28:18.20 World English Bible]

The first passage is often called the commissioning of Isaiah. Regular attendees at Zion have seen that passage at 'Recharge last week and at morning worship on April 19th. Since this

reflects Isaiah's calling into a successful ministry, I feel that it is worth reinforcing the ideas we can find there—especially as it relates to our own “general Christian commission.

It is almost the timer we celebrate the ascension and with it, the Great Commission—where all Christians were challenged by Jesus himself to spread the Good News around the world.

I am reminded that the commissioning of Isaiah into successful ministry has similar components to those that will make us successful—either in the general commissioning from Jesus to make disciples or in a specific/individual calling or commission that may come to each of us.

When we are called of God, it is important that we put ourselves in a position to succeed. Here are some things that may help make that happen:

- Acknowledge the holiness, the grandeur, the power and the majesty of God the creator, the sustainer of all that is, and with it his authority to call us to ministry.
- Acknowledge where we stand in comparison to God. Isaiah said he was “undone” in the translation above. Do notice though, that he didn't say he was worthless. We humans may be sinful and have unclean lips. We may be “undone” but we were worth the price paid in the sending of the Son.
- “Seek and accept the forgiveness that comes automatically when we recognize and repent of our “unclean lips” (and heart and soul and minds.) Believe that God can and will make us clean.
- Listen to the commission. Hear it. Embrace it with all our hearts. “Who will we send—who will go for us?” “Here I am, send me.”

The “Great” Commission is called that because that was the way God intended to get the Good News out to the world. Not shouted by angels from the mountains and from the skies, Not dropped from heaven on golden leaflets.

Human beings' sharing their faith is still God's methodology. Shared person to person—one starving beggar telling another where to find the Bread of Life.

Lived in front of our neighbors.

Preached by our lives.

“Preach the gospel always and if necessary use words.” [Attributed to Francis of Assisi]

April 12, 2015 Called Board Meeting Minutes

Members in Attendance:

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Rickie Smith.

The Property Committee (including Board members George Poffenberger, Sam Moss and David Benckert) met April 6, 2015 and had recommended to the board the purchase an 8ft x 16ft "Stage "Depot" stage and lighting system. The approximate cost is \$4,100, which they recommended to use Capital Funds. Due to amount, the committee is asking for Board approval.

Background:

Other items on the "Wish List" of improvements to the Christian Center are:

- Murals on front doors, to include replacement of the windows.
- Shed, to enable storage of items lawn care items, instead of 4th bay.
- ? Electric announcement sign to replace the present one.

Other more expensive items that will be needed for Christian Center in future:

- Climate control of bay area
- Handicap restroom
- Improvement to lighting in bay area

Other issues that board is aware of:

- Roof for Sanctuary (wait for funds from sale of parsonage)

Info David Benckert on Finances:

- Funds allocated for Christian Center Renovations equals \$3,344.

- Funds allocated to a general Capital Fund equals \$7,371.
- Total of these two - \$10,715.

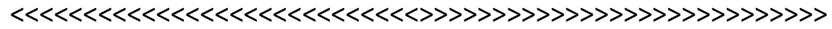

Some years ago, my grandmother Edwina (“Win” to her friends) bought a new silver car. Her cars are always the same color, always christened “Silver Bullet”; and always sport her infamous license plate, “GWTIN” (Gone With the Win). Curious, I phoned to ask what brand she’d bought.

“You know I don’t know those things,” she declared, “I just told them to send me a silver one.”

The car that replaced her Ford was silver DeVille, which she evidently mistook for a gussied up Taurus. Upon learning that her new ride was actually a Cadillac, Grandmother was mortified that she’d bought a vehicle that, in her mind only Presidents, potentates, and pop stars should drive.

Immediately, she began a campaign of subterfuge in an attempt to regain her automotive modesty, first by stealing my cousin's trailer-hitch cover (a rubber mallard head) and then shoving it down over her Caddy's proud hood ornament. Suitably disguised, her "Quackallac" was now free to travel the byways of South Alabama without pretension.

The duck even monitored my grandmother's speeding. Edwina routinely drives at a speed equal to her age—which polite grandsons don't mention in major magazines. Let's just say it's over any legal limit here in America. "I know I'm going too fast," she declares, "when that duck turns around and looks at me."

Curious to find out just what speed produced the glassy-eyed stare of a fake mallard, I took the Quackallac for a spin on the bypass one afternoon last summer. The duck looked straight ahead at 55, 65, and 75 m.p.h. Finally at 83 m.p.h., wind friction caused the head to turn around.
